Protecting biodiverse places

CAMEROON | Central Africa's ancient rainforests are home to chimpanzees, elephants, and people. But New York-based palm oil company Herakles Farms wants to slash and burn more than 170,000 acres. With our and others' support, the Struggle to Economize Future Environment won a stop-gap victory: the president reduced Herakles' concession to 20,000 acres and raised its rent by 1,400 percent. SEFE's outspoken leader, Nasako Besingi, is heavily persecuted for his activism so the struggle to protect Africa's oldest, richest rainforest—and the people defending it—continues.

Restoring health and rights

COLOMBIA | For 21 years, the government dusted coca fields with glyphosate, the main ingredient in RoundUp, killing food crops and exposing millions of indigenous and Afro-Colombian people to the herbicide. Last spring, after years of work by indigenous farmers, citizen groups, and our grantee Aso Manos Negra, and after the World Health Organization declared glyphosate is "probably carcinogenic," Colombia stopped aerial fumigation for good.

Transforming systems for change

CHINA | More than 42 percent of rivers are too severely polluted for human consumption. With our help, Green Qilu developed a public online database to score how government agencies in Shandong Province monitor industrial pollution. Volunteers test pollutant levels at dumping spots and log the results. The approach has been highly effective, transforming Shandong into China's leading province for pollution monitoring.

Highlights of 2015

Climate change is imperiling youth, women, and indigenous peoples. Global Greengrants is empowering these communities to fight it.

- Throughout 2014 and 2015, we partnered with 350.org to support youth leaders and groups to mobilize for climate action. Together, we are working to ensure young and indigenous leaders have the necessary tools to bring the global climate movement home to their communities. Learn more at Greengrants.org/YouthOnClimate.
- In August 2014, we co-hosted the Summit on Women and Climate in Bali. More than 95 people (funders, grassroots women, and indigenous leaders) from 37 countries strategized ways to engage decision makers to support projects that address both climate change and women's rights. We released our first-ever publication—Climate Justice and Women's Rights: A Guide to Supporting Grassroots Action—on International Women's Day 2015. Learn more at WomenAndClimate.org.

To better understand how our small grants support local leaders to participate in creating change, we undertook the first worldwide survey of our grantees, reaching out to 405 groups in 4l countries (31% response rate). Some key findings:

- Of the 85% who said they were trying to influence public opinion, policy, or decision-makers, 93% said they had done so successfully
- 79% said they belong to networks, tying them to larger environmental and social movements
- 40% said they're growing
- 38% said Global Greengrants was their first funder
